He left the staff in 1972 but returned 12 months later, was awarded his county cap in 1975 and was appointed county coach in 1977.

Phil made a spectacular debut in county cricket. The match was against Nottinghamshire at Trent Bridge and the young Russell was full of enthusiasm.


Notts were batting on the final day of the match, oking to set Derbyshire a target and Russell was fielding at square leg.
