wickets as, in a spectacular start, Derbyshire careered to 58-4 after only nine overs.

Had another wicket fallen quickly the whole story of the day might have been different as the pitch had pace and bounce and could still be a very useful one to bowl on.

Morris and Cork did not give Gloucestershire chance to find out as the fifth wicket partnership added 302, a Derbyshire record.

At that stage Cork retired hurt with a hamstring strain having needed the services of runner Chris Adams to make the last two runs to his century.

The injury may keep him out of action for a while, which is a pity as watching England manager Keith Fletcher must have been impressed.

Morris was at his best but this time for longer. After a watchful start he began to flow, with his second hundred taking only 70 balls.

He was disappointed to be out as his thoughts were turning to a triple hundred but in a county where the deeds of WG Grace and Walter Hammond are still talked about, this innings will certainly rate a mention.

Splendid Sussex success

Derbyshire achieved a tremendous double over Sussex at the weekend. County championship and Sunday League wins showed the county can gather momentum in the second half of the season after the rills of the first, writes Ian Hall.

It was inevitable that there would be a sense of anti-climax after the spectacular success in the Benson and Hedges Cup final, especially as Derbyshire were knocked out of the NatWest Trophy by Worcestershire in the week before Lord's. That was galling, as it was a match that Derbyshire should have won — and would have, had Devon Malcolm not conceded 77 runs off 11 overs.

If Malcolm was the villain at Worcester, he was the hero in the matches against Sussex. His figures of 6-57 in the championship victory were his best ever for Derbyshire as Sussex were crushed by 195 runs in three days. He followed up in the Sunday League by taking 4-42 to put a dent in Sussex's title ambitions and give Derbyshire renewed hope of getting into the top four.

As good as Maclolm's figures were, it was the way he bowled which impressed the professionals. He bowled a fuller length than has often been the case and, as a result, the ball swung a little way from the batsmen. At Malcolm's pace, that is hard to handle and Alan Wells, the

Derbyshire can now go forward with confidence to take on Gloucestershire and Durham in the next two matches. Wins at Cheltenham and Durham would do much to hoist Derbyshire up the respective championship and Sunday League tables and add substance to the Benson and Hedges success.
